# THE ROAD AHEAD

he book of *Ecclesiastes*tells us that 'there is a proper time and procedure for every matter' and that 'the wise heart will know the proper time and procedure' (8:5,6). So often God guides through circumstances, opening and closing doors in his good time, and helping us to be wise in our plans and priorities. We have had a real sense of the Father's leading over the last six months as the 'roadmap' has become more clear.

As 2003 dawned we planned to take on an Associate General Secretary, investigate a merger with MMA-Healthservetake on more space in Partnership House, install a new database, increase our media involvement and bring in specific training for the integration of faith and practice. The total cost for this was to be £110,000 extra per year (on our annual budget of £750,000) so we looked to you, our members, to make it possible through increased giving by a full-member subscription increase to £120 or £10 per member per month.

The first step on the path was our new constitution, which was accepted unanimously at the CMF AGM on 21 June. This enables us to formalise the direction we believe that God is calling us to take. It makes clear our new areas of focus in being a witness to patients, being a public voice for Christian values, becoming multidisciplinary in our overseas work and taking more responsibility for the growth of new Christian Medical groups throughout the world. Our revised aims are discipleship, evangelismission and proclamations follows:

- 1. To unite Christian doctors and medical students in Christ, and to encourage them to deepen their faith, live like Christ, and serve him obediently, particularly through acting competently and with compassion in their medical practice
- 2. To encourage Christian doctors and medical students to be witnesses for Christ among all those they meet.
- 3. To mobilise and support all Christian doctors, medical students, and other healthcare professionalsespecially members, in serving

Christ throughout the world.

4. To promote Christian values, especially in bioethics and healthcare, among doctors and medical students, in the church and in society.

Following this in July/August we are upgrading to *Oracle*, a 'state of the art' database system already used by over 70% of businesses worldwide. This upgrade will allow us to streamline greatly our membership system, improve handling of electronic correspondence, answer complicated queries, allow a transition to direct debit and online conference bookings, enhance considerably our ability to contact and link people and create an effective Christian medical cyber-community.

Next on the agenda is our proposed merger with MMA-Healthserve for which negotiations are proceeding amicably and are already at an advanced stage. MMA Healthserve, which celebrates its 125th anniversary this year, has worked closely with CMF for many years in mobilising Christian health professionals to serve Christ abroad. Our Overseas Support Secretary Peter Armon is jointly employed by both organisations. Under the proposals existing MMAHS staff would join a new expanded overseas department within CMF, which would become multidisciplinary and thereby act as a catalyst for those in professions allied to medicine to grow and develop their mission activities as well. The merger would bring considerably greater resources to CMF, and would simplify administration and cut duplication.

The timing of this merger, which both organisations are keen to complete, will depend on the availability of space in Partnership House. The ACC (Anglican Consultative Council), with whom we share the 5th floor of Partnership House, have signed a lease on another property in London and expect to be departing *in to to* around December 2003. We have long dreamt of several Christian healthcare organisations coming together to share space 'under one roof' and it seems this dream might now be coming true.

Allowing for the inevitable disruption and 'bedding-in' period for all these changes we

would aim to have an Associate General Secretary in post by April/May 2004. This would coincide with the Saline Solution Roadshow on integrating faith and practice, which was piloted last year and is being trailed this autumn after adaptation to a UK context. It is envisaged that the new post will greatly enhance the pastoral support and encouragement of CMF's graduate doctors, and especially GPs.

Alongside all these new developments we intend to keep developing all the good things we are already doing - the conferences, journals, regional meetings, student ministry, publications, correspondence etc. And we continue to press ahead with other recently launched projects which are drawing more people into the frame as staff or volunteers: our websites, new books, translations, media training, media involvement, summer teams, more support of ICMDA (especially in Europe) and networking at a higher level with more Christian organisations in the various fields of ministry we are involved in - ethics, mission and evangelism.

This last year has seen possibly the end of the cloning debate, as science has proved the pundits wrong, but otherwise on the ethical front things look depressing with an increased push for euthanasia, gay adoption, the morning after pill, the legalisation of marijuana and so on. All symptomatic of a society and a profession turning its back on God. I believe that Christian doctors will face more persecution in the coming days and that it will primarily be in the areas of our beliefs about the uniqueness of Christ, sexuality and the sanctity of life. There is a real call for members to get more involved, being salt and light at all levels of society and in the profession.

There is much to give thanks for, but also much more land to be possessed as we move forward together in Christ into 2003/4.

#### Student Staff

Staffworker posts are normally 4-5 sessions per week for two years, but other models are not impossible and we try to fit posts around an applicant's location and stage. Staffworkers are usually 24-32 years of age and spend the other half of their time in part time SHO, SpR or GP trainee or retainer posts, or in doing Bible College study. Salary is based on graduate teacher scales. CMF's relay programme is a great way to get training and expertise in student ministry for 6-12 months. The programme offers UCCF's theological and ministry training alongside

practical experience with one of CMF's current regional staffworkers. The programme would be most suitable for a recently-qualified junior doctor or a student able to take an intercalated year. ## Allister Vale writes New Publications

In 2002 CMF republished *Cure for Lifeby* Bernard Palmer. Two thousand copies were pre-sold thereby ensuring that the costs of the print run were covered even before general sales. In 2003/early 2004 the Publications Committee hopes to publish *Hard Questions about Health and Healing Christian Distinctives in Medicine* and *Mad, Bad or Sad*?

Former CMF General Secretary Andrew Fergusson's new book *Hard Questions about Health and Healinis* due to be published this September. The editing of *Christian Distinctives in Medicinis* Dr Michael Webb-Peploe has been completed and the script is now at copy-editing stage. It is not anticipated that *Mad, Bad and Sad* will be completed until late 2003 and therefore publication is not expected before 2004.

#### **Translations**

It has been agreed by the Executive Committee that £10,000 should be allocated to the publication of the Russian and Romanian editions of *Matters of Life and Death*, and the Albanian and Russian editions of *Cure for Life* 

The Russian translation of Matters of Life and Death was released on 26 June, with 1,000 copies available for CMF to distribute through summer teams and the Samara conference. By using MIRT Publishers of St Petersburg we have been able to produce 3,000 hardback copies at a cost of £3,000.

Dr Ileana Radu of the Christian Medical Association of Romania (CMAR) has agreed to coordinate translation of a Romanian edition by July 2003. For a print run of 1,000 copies, the total cost is £2,500.

Dr Eralda Turkeshi has completed the Albanian translation of *Cure for Life* and Vernon Publishing in Tirana are in the process of printing 1,000 for £1000 as *CMF News* went to press. Most of the copies will be given free to the students of the Albanian IFES movement (BSKSh) to use in their Bible studies as well as evangelism. A Russian translation is well underway.

#### Websites

Since January 2003 the newly designed CMF website at www.cmf.org.uk has received 111,059 visits by 70,232 visitors. The website CD-ROM is selling well and a new edition is

to be produced in 2003. Religious Studies on the Web (RS-Web) described our website www.ethicsforschools.org as this 'great new site for ethics'. There have been 10,271 visits to the website since January 2003 and 200 CD-ROMs have been sold at a cost of £5 each.

The Publications Committee has been fortunate in the last year in having the support of Jacky Engel BMedSci MA MPhil as Publications Assistant and we are delighted that the Executive Committee has extended Jacky's appointment until Summer 2004. Situated 100 miles from Frankfurt, the conference brought together 30 doctors and students from all over Germany. The talks tackled important JD issues with the last talk given by Dr Dankmar Stein who gave a moving testimony of his conversion to Christianity in an American POW camp. We were really touched by how welcome we were made to feel and how much effort had been put into ensuring quality fellowship among the doctors with each evening centred around eating and drinking in a café style atmosphere. It is really encouraging to witness how much juniors' work has grown in Germany with almost nothing for this group of doctors pre-1996. We have been lucky to have a number of the German junior doctors committee join us at our Beyond the Bleep conferences in the UK and hope to welcome more international guests at future conferences here in the UK.

#### **Ethics**

#### John Wyatt writes



There has been no let-up in the steady stream of ethical issues which have come to prominence over this last year. Probably the issue of greatest concern to the CMF Study Group has been

that of euthanasia and assisted suicide. It is plain that the legal and political consensus on euthanasia which has survived in the UK since the House of Lords Select Committee report in 1994 is

now being seriously challenged. Lord Joffe's Patient Assisted Dying Bill, which passed its second reading in the House of Lords on 6 June, is just one of several moves towards the legalisation of some form of mercy killing in the UK. As a Fellowship it is clear that we have a special role to play in the public debate and the Study Group has been keen to try to mobilise CMF members with clinical expertise in relevant areas to write to politicians and to make their voices heard. One of the most important needs is to counter media misinformation about conditions such as motor neurone disease and to emphasise the role and the success of modern palliative care methods.

The CMF Files series has continued to develop and the last year has seen the publication of files on the Mind Body problem, Advance directives, Homosexuality and Sex Selection. We are extremely grateful to a number of authors for their contributions, and to Pete Moore and Peter Saunders who have provided vital editorial oversight. The files are being distributed widely to schools and colleges and increasingly internationally as well (the first 20 files are currently being translated into Chinese!) Further articles are in the pipeline and as always we welcome feedback and suggestions for topics and for authors.

#### **London Missionary Breakfast**

#### **CMF Summer Teams**

Student/doctor summer teams go out each year, mainly to help run evangelistic camps. This year teams are planned in Kursk (Russia, 4-12 July), Simferopol (Ukraine, 4-8 August), Tver (Russia, 4-11 Aug), Bulgaria (first week of Aug), Yerevan (Armenia, date to be confirmed) and Tirana (Albania, August) and at further locations in Central Asia and the Balkans. Much prayer is needed for planning, finance and team members.

There will also be a conference for Russian-speaking students from all over the former USSR in Samara, Russia (15-20 July) for which over 150 were booked at the time CMF News went to press.



# Mission Mattes

#### **Peter Armon writes**



I was speaking recently at a Church weekend on the subject of worship and at one point we were looking at the worship/work interface within the church. We are all constantly being bombarded with

demands 'to get more involved' in the activities of local church, local CMF groups or whatever and in a previous newsletter I was adding to the burden by calling on more members to get involved overseas. But many will say 'I just don't have the time there are only 24 hours in the day and I have to balance the needs of work, family, local church'etc.

As we searched the Scripture, it was interesting to note that God seems to be more interested in seeking worshippers than workers but it is a heart set on worship that is most likely to respond to a call to service. When God appeared to Isaiah in the Temple (Isaiah 6), he fell down before him in worship and repentance. He got up in response to God's call on his life saying 'Here am I, send me'.

It was in the context of a worshipping group of disciples that Jesus gave his great commission to go into all the world with the Gospel (Matthew 28:19,20). It will be in the context of God revealing himself to us in the face of Jesus Christ and in the light of our understanding of what he has done for us in Christ that we find meaning and the purpose for our life here on earth. CT Studd, a pioneer missionary in the latter part of the nineteenth century, once said, 'If Jesus Christ be God and died for me, no sacrifice I make can be too great for him'.

Those of us who have experienced 'falling in love' will know that there is nothing we wouldn't do for the one we love, nowhere we wouldn't go to be with that person and nothing we wouldn't do to please him/her. That's basically what worship is all about. It was out of his relationship with his Father that Jesus said he always tried to do what he knew would please him (John 8:29) and that he chose to do only what he saw his Father doing (John 5:19).

Dr Martin Lloyd Jones once said 'My whole outlook... should be governed by these three things: my realisation of who I am (in Christ), my consciousness of where I am going and my knowledge of what awaits me when I get there'. Perhaps that's just another way of saying the same thing.

What is it that would please you Father about the way I spend my life? Open my eyes that I may see what are you doing and where are you at work Father, so that I may join you there.

## Opportunities in Short Term Medical Mission

About 45 doctors and medical students attended this inaugural conference at Partnership House, London on 28 June to hear David Carling and Ted Lankester talk on the biblical basis and changing face of medical mission and to learn from a variety of seminars on short term service abroad. It is intended this will become an annual event.

#### Global Healthcare Forum at Partnership House, London 26 November 2003

Entitled 'The future of Healthcare Mission in Sub-Saharan Africa' this promises to be an absorbing day. It is being jointly organised by the Healthcare Mission and Africa Forums of Global Connections. Keynote speakers will include Dick Anderson of AIM, giving an overview of the continent and Stan Rowland of Medical Ambassadors International talking on programmes integrating community health, development and evangelism, as a strategy for outreach in Africa. There will also be a range of seminars running throughout the day on a variety of topics including AIDS, primary healthcare, mission hospitals and providing healthcare in conflict zones.

The overall aim of the day will be to highlight the key issues facing the continent and the strategies already in place to meet those needs as well as identifying areas where work still needs to be done to develop and co-ordinate strategic responses by agencies working in the region.

## Finance Matter

#### 2002 Accounts

The accounts for 2002 have now been audited, and approved by the General Committee, and there is much to give thanks for in the last 12 months. The 2002 deficit of £11,038 on income of £814,012 is encouraging given all the circumstances. The work has developed very significantly, with nearly £100,000 more spent in 2002 than 2001. All of the loss can be attributed to the unrealised losses incurred by our modest investment. However it must be acknowledged that the accounts have been improved significantly by a legacy of £50,000, the largest gift ever received by the Fellowship.

#### **Subscriptions Increase**

We are thrilled by the generous way in which the subscription increase has been accepted by the membership – thank you

Lord for generous doctors! It has increased from £75 to £120, or £10 per month, for those in full time practice as from 1 January 2003. In addition student membership is now offered free for the first year, and £10 per annum thereafter, or £25 for 3 years.

#### Accounts activity

Audrey Pegler, our accountant has not been well for a good part of this year, and continues off sick. As a consequence, it has not been possible yet to produce quarterly management accounts for the 1 st quarter of 2003, and we are behind on several activities including the acknowledgement of subscriptions and gifts, setting up new and replacement bankers orders, and reclaiming Gift Aid tax. Please accept our apologies in particular if Audrey's absence means that setting up your bankers order is slow, and we are slow in acknowledging subscriptions and donations; we do continue to be

immensely grateful to the Lord for the membership's generosity.
