National Student Conference (NSC), at Swanwick, 10-12 February.

About 400 gathered together for an excellent weekend conference. John Lennox, Professor of Mathematics at Oxford and well known for his debates with the New Atheists, spoke superbly from Genesis about Joseph. Abi Boys, a max-fax trainee currently studying dentistry, inspired everyone in her conference address; 'Developing World Mission', 'live out the love of Jesus in overseas medical mission', 'see the one, love the one'.

There were great seminars, a brilliant bookstall from 10ofthose, and a lot of fun. Pray that the enthusiasm of these students to live and speak for Jesus would carry on back in medical school and F1, at work and at home, in the UK and abroad.

International Medical Student Leaders' Conference (IMSC), at CMF in London, 6-10 February.

This year's IMSC was the largest we've ever held. 26 international student leaders attended, from 21 countries: from South Africa to Russia, from Norway to Jordan. Half the delegates were from former Communist countries, but this year we also targeted countries in the southwest of Europe: France, Belgium, Italy, Spain and Portugal. In some of these countries there is very little Christian witness, and no Christian medical group. It was wonderful to be able to help connect and equip these young leaders for service back home. We started each morning with readings from 2 Timothy, studying what it means to be a young leader in difficult circumstances, keeping a clear focus on the gospel. Let's pray that they use what they learned as they work for the growth of God's

kingdom in healthcare in their own countries and beyond.



He argues that although much can be done through conferences, literature and public policy work, our real priority must be to strengthen and support the grassroots networks and relationships between ordinary Christian doctors and medical students at a local and regional level.

Local networks are essential. Although membership of the local church is vital, doctors often need to talk and pray with others who understand the challenges of medicine. And yet building closer links is not easy. Doctors are busy with family, church and work responsibilities. Churches don't always understand why medics need the support of Christian peers and often it is difficult to identify fellow Christians in the workplace.

We want to rectify this. During 2012 our main priority is to build local fellowship to support you better and to help us recruit new members and retain existing members more effectively. To this end we are looking for members who are willing to act as local links in every church, workplace and local area and we are developing the website to provide much better links between members.

When the website changes are complete, a secure, personal log-in will give access to personalised pages and online links with other members and help to supply you with connections, opportunities, resources, training and support to help you fulfil Christ's calling in this generation.

Our CMF staff are also on hand to provide you with the information, resources, guidance and support you need to get together to pray and share together and to support and encourage others in their service through medicine.

Against that gloomy background, the CMF Christmas Carol Service at All Souls Langham Place drew around 300 health professionals from all over London, and seemed to lift spirits, especially with John Wyatt's inspiring talk on the scandal and miracle of the incarnation.

Also, we ran a day conference for nurses in Nottingham in March on keeping a pure heart in our ministry,

ur regional day conference last November brought together 40 of us to consider resilience to stress in ourselves and our

organisations, healthy boundaries in our lives, and the relationship between love and work, within the framework of Jesus' ministry to us as the Good Shepherd.

We have two new local member groups now meeting in Hertfordshire. I recently visited the first of these, and the variety and intensity of challenges people are facing at work demonstrated again the value of such fellowship. Partnership in International Medical Education

MF is working with PRIME to develop the Values Added course. The course,

which is being piloted this spring, is designed to help doctors in the first four years after qualification to build a Christian worldview into their routine practice. PRIME has developed the 6module Values Added course from experience gained working in Europe, Asia and Africa. In the last year PRIME has delivered 55 separate programmes in 15 countries involving 74 different tutors, teaching and training more than 3,750 individuals. The Course aims to:

- provide supportive fellowship through small local groups for Christian doctors in the first four years of their postgraduate experience
- enable Christian junior doctors to maintain and increase their faith during formative training by providing a challenge to the pervading secularism of the scientific and clinical training they receive
- empower Christian juniors to demonstrate, defend and advocate with confidence to others, a practice of medicine built on the life, model and teaching of Jesus

Annual conference

PRIME's annual conference is an opportunity to hear from PRIME's tutors and to help shape PRIME's programmes in the future. 'Teaching to Change Hearts in Healthcare' is the title of the conference to be held in Aylesford, near Maidstone from 9-11 May.
