Compassionate care needed

are is the main theme in this CMF spring mailing: God's care for us, our care for our patients and our care for each other.

The Francis Report has highlighted a failure of care in the NHS and the Chief Nursing Officer for England has issued a call for nursing to recover its core values – particularly care, compassion, courage, commitment and communication.

In *Triple Helix,* Steve Fouch calls for Christian doctors and nurses to be 'agents of change and transformation' at this 'watershed moment'. CMF President Sam Leinster, in a reflection on the

Beatitudes challenges us to work'with colleagues and patients to create a merciful healthcare plan'. David Chaput de Saintonge gives us a ten point plan for 'staying compassionate' and David Cranston challenges us 'to care as Christ cared' with a 'servant heart'.

In a powerful testimony Verona Beckles relates her turning point back to faith in realising that nothing she could do could make God love her more or love her less. Like a 'prodigal daughter' God saw her from afar, pursued her and 'scooped' her up.

Vicky Lavy, in a fast-moving review of medical missions, shows how care for the sick and dying has been a hallmark of the Christian Church over the centuries and how people of other faiths desire to be treated in mission hospitals as beacons of safe, compassionate care.

Paul Adams takes us back to the very heart of Christian morality with the reminder that fulfilling 'the law of Christ' involves 'bearing one another's burdens' (Galatians 6:2) and dares to dream of a world where 'responsibilities come before rights and duty of care for others has priority over personal ambition'.

Helpful book reviews assess how effectively psychotherapies deliver care, how caring in the wrong way can hurt rather than help, how to care for those with unwanted same sex attraction and how to honour personhood in patients'.

But in all this I was particularly struck by Martin Lloyd Jones' reminder that humanity's ultimate need is 'not that he is sick, unhappy, poor or uneducated'. Our real need is for 'forgiveness, reconciliation and regeneration' through Christ's death which averts God's wrath and deals with our sin.

Good healthcare adds length and quality to this life and shows God's care and compassion but Jesus Christ came ultimately not to empty the hospitals but to empty the graveyards!

I do pray that these spring editions of *CMF News* and *Triple Helix* will encourage, equip and inspire us as we seek to serve Christ, our patients and each other.

The wonderful students' conference in February, the international leaders' conference which preceded it and the National Coonference coming on 26-28 April – where I hope you will join us – are all opportunities for us to build up and strengthen each other and learn from God's Word and each other's example.



We continue to rejoice that over 200 members have now volunteered to act as link people for their localities, workplaces, churches, deaneries, specialities and foundation schools to help build these connections and hope to welcome more.

Work on our new integrated online website and database has been delayed but the fruit will soon appear, enabling effective and secure connections between our members and giving you your own personalised pages. The challenges are many but our God is able and has promised to equip us for the task and walk by our side each day.

May I wish you all God's wisdom, blessing and enabling as you seek to serve Christ through medicine this year.

What will you leave behind?

any people avoid the issue of preparing a will because it forces them to face the fact of their own mortality. However, as followers of Jesus Christ, we should consider the preparation

of a will as an important act of good Christian stewardship.

Scripture teaches us that everything in the world belongs to God (see, for example Psalm 24:1 and Psalm 50:12). Throughout the Bible, we are called to be good stewards (managers) of the assets the Lord has given us.

Jesus himself says this in Luke 12:42ff, 'who then is the faithful and wise manager, whom the master puts in charge of his servants to give them their food allowance at the proper time? It will be good for that servant whom the master finds doing so when he returns.' Paul continues the theme in 1 Corinthians, 'Now it is required that those who have been given a trust must prove faithful' (4:2). Therefore the preparation of a will is the distribution clause for the assets he has entrusted to us.

Over the years, donations left to CMF in wills have contributed significantly to the development of our ministry. Many reading this will have benefitted from membership of CMF over the decades. Discriminatory abortion for disability

n early March CMF provided a submission to a new Parliamentary Group inquiring into abortion on grounds of disability. The normal upper limit on abortion is 24 weeks. However abortion can be performed right up to term if 'there is substantial risk that if the child were born it would suffer from such physical or

mental abnormalities as to be seriously handicapped'. The CMF submission, being drafted as this issue of CMF News goes to press, contends there are problems of definition and, more importantly, of discrimination. See the website for details.

Planting a 'faith flag'

n a London cab on the way to the CMF offices Bob Snyder, deviser of the International Saline course,



found himself caught in traffic outside the Houses of Parliament.'What do you think of the politicians who work here?' he


asked his driver. Here was a question few London cabbies can resist and the words tumbled out.

Then he pointed to nearby Westminster Abbey. 'What do you think of the church?' Again the cabbie had plenty to say: in essence, 'No one goes there!' So what did he think about God?'I'm not religious myself but I believe in God. I believe in football even more.'

This is an example of what Bob Snyder calls'planting faith flags' and it's one of the core methods of Saline Solution, CMF's programme that helps Christians create opportunities to share their faith. 'How it works is you put down your flag in common ground you create. Then if the person grabs it you can talk more.' No pressure. Many people won't grab the flag, but when they do, you need to be ready and equipped to keep the conversation going.

Bob recalls years ago as a hospital emergency doctor plucking up the courage to plant a flag in one of the most sensitive moments that ever comes the way of a doctor. 'I had felt a conviction from God that I didn't take death seriously enough. So after an unsuccessful resuscitation procedure I went through the usual routine, pronouncing time of death and cause of death. Then I said, "Before we all leave we need to recognise something very important has happened here. Let's bow our heads and be quiet for 15

He had felt full of trepidation. But when he opened his eyes he found half of the group



not merely with damp eyes but openly weeping. It led to several conversations with colleagues over the next few weeks, all of them admitting they were scared to die and wanting to know more about what he was talking about.

The Saline Solution approach steers clear of arguments. 'No one will ever come to Christ because he or she lost an argument with

Bob Snyder,' he says. How did things end up with his London cab driver? 'Who knows? I simply gave him a good tip (too many people think Christians are mean) and said, "I hope you will think about God a bit more today!"'

CMF regularly runs Saline Solution courses. Contact CMF if you would like to attend or to host a Saline Solution training event at your church. The team will undertake as many courses as there are invitations.

Despite massive motorway travel disruptions more than 350 medical students attended.

Foundational to discipleship is an understanding of Jesus' death and resurrection, Jason declared. The disciple can only follow because Jesus has died and risen in his or her place. What Jesus did for us is always prior to how we live for him.' And this will enable us as disciples to do what Jesus calls us to do.

Jesus says that if God doesn't even forget a sparrow, the cheapest item in the market, he will not forget you when you have the courage to nail your colours to the mast and speak up for your faith in a tutorial group or with your family. 'It's impossible, says Jesus, to be a true follower of him and be a silent witness.'




