Students enjoyed Aaron Poppleton giving an inspiring address on 'Being a Christian medic in an international world', focusing especially on the opportunities closest to us in Europe. Seminars on topics such as 'When Christians disagree' and 'Suffering' were, as usual, popular and highly rated. Again there were great offers at the





bookstall including the new Human Journey course, currently being used by a number of student groups.

Overall the students loved meeting with friends and making new ones, with large numbers this year from HYMS, Southampton and Imperial in particular. It was great to welcome international students from the SYD conference and a privilege to be inspired by and to pray with them. We were sad

to say goodbye to Laura Risdale this year who has organised the conference for over ten years - she will be sadly missed and received a great send off from the students.

A comment from one of the delegates just about sums it up: 'Thank you for everything! I couldn't feel more blessed to attend your amazing conference. I learnt so much, got to know so many Christian brothers and sisters around the UK and the world. I was encouraged and inspired. It was a little piece of heaven.'

Saline is a bridgehead



hy do we encourage CMF members to meet? Isn't local church fellowship sufficient, especially with time so seemingly scarce nowadays?

There is unique value in gathering with others who are dealing with similar challenges in



The guiding principles we suggest for anyone leading a local group, or considering doing so, are:

- Benefit. For all the cost of time and energy, there should be net gain, a sense afterwards of 'That was well worth it!'
- Relationship. For most of us the diary already has plenty of meetings, such that 'meeting' has become a dreaded noun.
 But 'meeting' as a verb is quite another matter. Gathering in person, with others committed to our good, builds friendship and trust.

- Sustainability. Sustainability. Decide what you're happy to continue with in terms of frequency and preparation. Some groups will meet over a meal, but for others a hot drink and a snack is more practicable.
 Eating out is another option, given the right venue.
- Flexibility. Flexibility. What's called for is whatever best serves the local membership. Most groups gather on weekday evenings but Saturday brunch, or a weekend afternoon tea, are options that some have found fruitful – especially as an occasion for bringing along family members.

Together we can explore scriptures particularly relevant to medicine and healthcare, share any current burdens, discuss and debate ethical issues or cultural themes, worship, and pray for each other.

CMF Prayer Summit

Over the weekend of 16-18 January, about 80 CMF members, a blend of students, junior doctors and more seasoned graduates, met for a special CMF Prayer Summit. It's widely agreed that Christian doctors are facing tougher challenges than perhaps ever before: tightening budgets but increased demands as well as heightening hostility to matters of faith. The gathering was an opportunity to review aspects of the past and seek God's direction for the future.

Public policy

o far this year CMF has made three submissions to government inquiries,

Counter-Terrorism and Security Bill (January 2015)

CMF's purpose was to affirm the importance of free speech on campus, while recognising the potential risk of misuse of higher education institutions as platforms for drawing people into terrorism.

Northern Ireland: Abortion for lethal fetal abnormality and sexual crime (January 2015)

CMF's submission claimed (among other things) that accurate assessment of the degree of disability is very difficult. The DoH figure for the number of Irish women coming to England and Wales for terminations of pregnancy on Ground E (those for fetal abnormality) in 2011 was 51.

House of Lords legislation on mitochondrial disease (January 2015)

General election: a nation decides

he countdown is well and truly underway for the general election on 7 May 2015. With the polls showing support for the major parties keenly divided, Christians have an opportunity to be of influence. So it's important that Christians use their democratic right to vote, take an intelligent interest in the key policy issues, get along to local hustings and take the opportunity to quiz candidates about their views and voting intentions. Clearly for Christian doctors and health professionals, the NHS and its future looms large as an electoral issue.

To get a measure of where each of the political parties stand on key issues, the BBC's Manifesto Watch (bbc.in/1xvhm86) is a useful and concise guide to where parties stand on these ten top issues. To track how your local MP voted

ICMDA roundup

In the ICMDA Eurasia region there are many historically Roman Catholic countries. Even so there has been a lot of work building links between Christian medics. There have been two conferences for junior doctors, held first in Rome in the spring, then last autumn in Madrid, which drew 70 people. There are growing movements in France, Belgium and Spain and a new group in Italy.

The next ICMDA World Congress will be in Hyderabad in 2018.

This two-week annual event continues to be much appreciated. It is for people exploring doing medical work (short or long term) in resourcepoor settings or people working overseas wishing to update their skills. There is a blend of lectures, practical skills workshops and tutorials, plus Bible teaching, prayer and reflection. It offers unique networking opportunities. For more detailed Christian analysis a good starting place is the Evangelical Alliance (EA) of which CMF is a member. Its website (bit.ly/1x0hC2s) is packed full of helpful information. The EA has devoted an entire issue of its magazine *Idea* to Christian commentary on the elections. There is, for example, advice on one of the big questions exercising Christians: Can I support a particular party where one or more of its policies is in opposition to my beliefs? There are also succinct thumbnail guides to the parties and their policies. In an uncertain world our faith offers one certainty: God is sovereign in human affairs. Our votes count. So too do our prayers.
