1. Western saviours?

Interested in global health? Have you ever considered that unequal power dynamics exist in international aid? Have you ever considered that missionary aid has historically flowed from former colonial powers to former colonised regions? Have structural inequalities and western saviour ideology influenced mission work? How could we contribute to dismantling discriminatory structures within mission work? Should we as students aim to serve God across the world? Do we have a right to be going? What on earth can we offer?

Come for a lively interactive seminar on God's heart for mission, ongoing global health needs, and why and how we can respond to some of these difficult questions.

Fi McLachlan, Head of Global at CMF, has a background in social work and healthcare management. She has worked in mission, based in South-East Asia, and currently serves on the International Committee of Tearfund as well as being a board member of a large hospital in the Gulf.

Amina Kaloko is a Deep:ER Fellow and intercalating student in London. She has a keen interest in global health, especially analysing and critiquing historical mission work. She has also been involved in projects around 'decolonising' medical education at the University of Bristol.

2. Sharing your Faith with Muslim Friends

Muslims believe in Jesus and his Virgin Birth; they believe that God revealed the Torah to Moses and the Gospel to Jesus. Yet Islam denies the crucifixion and resurrection of Jesus, denies Jesus' divinity and believes our Bible is hopelessly corrupted. How's that for some great conversation starters...?

Mark Pickering is CMF Chief Executive and a prison GP. During his student days in London, he spent many Sunday afternoons at Speakers' Corner in Hyde Park talking with Muslims; this sparked a lifelong interest in understanding Islam and Muslims.

4. What on earth is heaven?

What happens to us when we die? What will heaven be like? Is it a place of pink fluffy clouds, angels and cherubs playing harps? Is the Gospel really just about 'saving souls for heaven'? If so, why be a doctor? Why cure physical illnesses if the material creation will be destroyed at the end of time?

In this seminar we will re-examine what the Bible has to say about heaven... and earth. What we discover is that the Gospel isn't an escape hatch to heaven, but a call to be part of bringing the kingdom of heaven to our square inch of the earth.

Jim Paul is a former palliative care consultant and now director of English L'Abri, a Christian community that provides space for people to explore their questions and doubts about the Christian faith. He is author of 'What on earth is heaven?' (IVP, 2021)

5. Christian Friendship

Building strong and intimate friendships is of central importance to living as a Christian, and yet there is surprisingly little teaching or discussion about the topic. This seminar will look at biblical teaching about friendship, including intergenerational or 'Paul-Timothy' friendships, and asks how we can translate this into building strong friendships as students. What can we learn from recent 'spiritual abuse' scandals in the church and what are the 'red flags' that indicate when relationships are becoming unhealthy, coercive and abusive? What are the hallmarks of healthy intimate friendships and how can we make them stronger?

John Wyatt is CMF President and Emeritus Professor of Neonatology. He is currently a senior researcher at the Faraday Institute, and a sought-after speaker and writer on medical ethics and related topics.

6. Doctrine or Dogma: When Christians Disagree...

The number of Christian denominations worldwide is thought to be in the thousands. We can easily begin to ask how so many different beliefs can possibly be held under one banner; how do we separate what is holy from what is heresy? In an increasingly polarised world, is it possible to have a unified Church without compromising on our core Christian beliefs? This session will aim to look at how we can learn to disagree well as Christians, both with each other and the wider secular world.

7. Mental Health within a Biblical Worldview

More than one in four of us will have a significant episode of psychiatric illness at some time in our lives. The World Health Organisation now says that depression is the largest single cause of ill health across the world. As Christian health professionals we have a special responsibility for people with mental health problems, who are often stigmatised or marginalised, and to help our churches minister to them. The seminar will seek to answer -

- How do we make sense of secular models of mental illness from a Christian perspective?
- What is the role of sin in mental illness?
- Any other questions you bring along!

Nick Land is a psychiatrist, a retired medical director of a large mental health trust, an Anglican Reader and a previous chair of Christian Medical Fellowship.

8. Advocacy: Helping beyond healing

What is advocacy? Why should I care, and what difference could I really make anyway? The Bible is pretty clear that God cares about those society rejects or dismisses. In this seminar we will look at what the Bible says to those who

have influence about those who don't. We'll consider how that relates to 21st century healthcare and what you can be doing now to answer his call.
