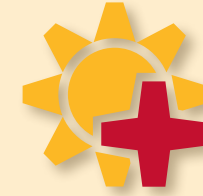

## Health and Education for the Quechuas of Peru

## History

The situation of the Quechua Indians in the Peruvian highlands

Since the conquest of Peru by the Spaniards in the 16th century, the descendants of the Inca (Quechuas) have lived under constant social discrimination. In the Apurímac region, over 80% of the Indians live in severe poverty. Their medical need is reflected by the high rate of infant mortality and low average life expectancy.



Almost 35% of the Quechuas in Apurímac are illiterate. In the 2012 OECD PISA study, Peru ranked last in reading skills, mathematics, and sciences of all participating countries. The educational opportunities of indigenous children are especially poor, impeding their future chances to prosper.



### Two doctors with a clear vision for the Indians of Peru

Ever since their teenage years, the Johns have felt the strong call to help the poorest of the poor. Dr. Klaus John completed his medical training as a surgeon in Germany, the USA (Harvard and Yale), and in South Africa. His wife Dr. Martina John was trained in both Germany and the USA (Yale affiliated) and is certified in pediatrics in both countries.

Along with others who share their burden, the Johns founded the Diospi Suyana non-profit organization in August 2002. The declared goals of this group are to establish and maintain an interdenominational mission hospital, a school, and a children's ministry in Curahuasi, Peru. The name "Diospi Suyana" means "We trust in God" in Quechua. On April 22, 2010, the Johns received the Peruvian citizenship honoris causa by the Peruvian Congress.



## The Diospi Suyana Hospital

The fulfillment of a great dream

On May 24, 2005, Diospi Suyana celebrated its ground-breaking ceremony. Without a guaranteed budget, the project advanced without credit or debt by depending entirely on incoming donations. To make their vision known, the Johns have given more than 3,200 presentations in 27 countries. As a result some 150,000 private individuals and 240 companies have donated money and equipment worth over US\$ 42 million.



▲ The inauguration of the hospital on August 31, 2007 was a national event and was filmed by nine television crews. In her speech before 4,500 guests, the First Lady of Peru, Pilar Noreas de García, called the mission hospital a "cathedral of love".



◀ Some 40 missionaries work hand in hand with 180 Peruvian colleagues. As of August 2022, the hospital has served more than 506,000 patients. The modern facility has 100 beds, six operating rooms, 16 outpatient offices, two ICUs, laboratory, an x-ray unit with a CT-scanner, a physical therapy department as well as a dental and ophthalmology clinic. ▼



## The Diospi Suyana School

A high quality education with Christian values

In order to improve the education crisis in the region, Diospi Suyana built a school in Curahuasi that has the capacity to enroll 700 children. The institution prides itself with modern classrooms in chemistry, biology, physics, music and arts. A library as well as a multipurpose sports offer up-to-date facilities. National and foreign staff members teach classes.



The inauguration of the school took place on March 14, 2014.



## The Diospi Suyana Kids Clubs

Attention, love, and hope for children in need



In November 2005, the first kids club was founded. What started in a small living room has grown into 10 clubs that attract up to 400 boys and girls every week. Through a diverse program of games, crafts and Biblical teaching, the children receive special attention and learn the love of God.
