Dr Amy Orr-Ewing is an international author, speaker and theologian who addresses the deep questions of our day with meaningful answers found in the Christian Faith. She is the author of multiple books including 'Where is God in All the Suffering?' and bestselling, 'Why Trust the Bible?'

Amy is interested in the intersection of questions of meaning and faith with the marketplace, education and policymaking. Amy holds a doctorate in Theology from the University of Oxford. She enjoys broadcasting in the media and giving public lectures. Over the last twenty years, Amy has given talks and answered questions on university campuses around the world. She has also addressed UK Parliamentarians, and in the US staffers on Capitol Hill, and at the West Wing of The White House. She speaks in banks, businesses, and consultancy firms as well as churches and conferences.

Amy is also the co-founder of REBOOT, an innovative youth initiative aimed at helping teenagers think deeply about faith, which now runs in countries all over the world. Amy lives in Oxford with her husband 'Frog'. They have three boys, JJ, Zach and Benji.

Julie-Ann Amartey is a final year Leicester medical student and current Global Track and CMF Global Committee member. Julie-Ann's first experience of global mission was with her church where she went on a short-term vision trip to India. Since then, her desire to serve God through mission has taken her to South Africa, Egypt, Uganda, and Rwanda with different organisations. Once qualified, Julie-Ann aims to serve long-term in medical mission.

Speaking for Christ in the Culture Wars

The last decade has seen identity politics transform the western world. Movements such as #MeToo, Black Lives Matter, Pride and the transgender movement have told the captivating narrative of oppressed identity groups who are rising up to fight their societal oppressors. However, in this grand narrative, Christians have found themselves labelled as the oppressors who need to be overthrown.

In this seminar, we will be looking at how we can speak for Christ in this challenging world of identity politics, in ways that are faithful to the Bible, loving to our neighbours, and credible to a hostile world.

This seminar will particularly focus on gender identity in children and young people. The itinerant medic - the joys and challenges of regularly changing teams, hospitals, cities and churches'

I have worked in 8 hospitals, lived in 5 cities, 9 houses and attended 5 churches since qualifying as a doctor in 2014. This can result in rootlessness and a sense of anonymity making it hard to share your faith and grow as a Christian. However, it also has allowed me to interact with hundreds of members of staff and church family members. Whether you're a fresher just moved to a new city and trying to find your feet or a student on placement far away from campus, this seminar will help you explore your roots, found in God and how this provides stability as we move from place to place, as well as some practical tips on settling into new places.

Death with real dignity - care and compassion at the end of life

What is truly compassionate end of life care? Does this mean helping patients to end their lives? Surely there is a better way? We will explore what good care might look like, and why actively ending someone's life is not the best or right response to terminal illness. We will explore arguments from both sides of this discussion and consider some of the changes of law that have occurred in other parts of the world. We'll also review current public policy developments in this field, and how we might respond.

Laurence Crutchlow is a GP in southwest London. His clinical practice includes looking after terminally ill patients in care homes and in the wider community. He is Associate Head of Student Ministries at CMF.



Enablement for Christians - dealing with disability in myself and others

Society tells us that our value comes from our productivity, and it praises self-reliance and autonomy above all. But what if one's mind or body is not able to meet these standards? These individuals and those who support them have often found themselves excluded both from the wider society and sadly also from church fellowships.

Whether through our own struggles or in supporting others around us, disability affects everyone. So what does God have to say about disability? How can our own lived experience of ill health draw us closer to God? And how can the way we treat each other point others to Jesus?

Steve Sturman is Associate Head of Doctors' Ministries and a Professor of Neuro-rehabilitation medicine in the Midlands.

Léonie Fourel is an F1 in Plymouth. She grew up in France and came to the UK to study medicine. She struggled with deteriorating physical and mental health at medical school, and eventually had to repeat a year because of these difficulties. She is passionate about supporting other students and healthcare professionals through their own health challenges.



The Bible is not about you, it's about God! - A Bible overview

The Bible is not about you, it's about God and is central to the Christian faith! Understanding the Bible's overall structure, differing genres and the narrative that weaves through all 66 books, can help deepen our knowledge and love of God as we read and study it for ourselves.

This seminar will give an overview of the Bible as well as practicalities and resources on how to study it well ourselves. The aim is to help us see that this seemingly random collection of books, written over thousands of years (even the bits we find difficult to read and understand) show us who God is and who he has always been.


