Darkness and destiny - God's providence in a broken world

Isaiah looks on as the lights go out. Rejection of God. Social injustice. Imperial aggression. Defeat and despair. How do we understand God's sovereignty in such a broken world?

We grapple with the same problems in our broken world today and especially so given the darkness and hopelessness of the pandemic. Where is God? Is he still in control of the world and all that is happening? How is he working out his purposes? How do we make sense of it all?

Yet even as Isaiah's warnings go unheeded, promises of an extraordinary destiny keep coming – not just for his people, but for the whole world. Promises of restoration and forgiveness, of an international people of God and a new earth for them to inhabit. A vision of God's servant, somebody who somehow, at great cost, would bring it all about.

We live and work in a world which sometimes feels increasingly dark, and rarely has Isaiah's proclamation seemed more relevant. Come and be reminded of the providence of God, and of our destiny in his plans.

Future battlegrounds – defending healthcare professionals' freedom of conscience for the good of society

4. Even though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death

Being familiar with death and dying doesn't mean there is no personal impact on us. Yet we rarely talk about it and how it affects the care we give. This seminar will look at how we navigate the valley of the shadow of death in our professional lives but also when it touches us personally, in the reality and hope of the comfort that knowing Jesus brings

5. Preventing burnout: what does Christ-like resilience look like?

Burnout amongst junior doctors seems to be at an all-time high. Whilst the recent demands of COVID have greatly contributed, modern postgraduate training seems to cultivate an inherent vulnerability. The Christian calling to 'go the extra mile' can also be an additional driver. Resilience training usually comprises a brief theoretical module that sadly often further compounds a struggling trainee's misconceptions that they are 'failing'. In contrast, this seminar will explore what Christ-like whole-life resilience looks like. Whether you are burnt-out already, fast approaching burn-out, or think you are immune from burnout altogether, this empowering seminar is for you.

"...from the one who has been entrusted with much, much more will be asked" (Luke 12:48b). We have been given the publicly respected title of "Doctor", but as Christian doctors, how can we use our voices effectively for God's kingdom in our everyday lives, on our personal social media accounts, in the public square, within healthcare bodies, and in the wider media?

Melody Redman is a clinical genetics registrar in Yorkshire and has a background in clinical academic paediatrics. She is Director of Communications for The Healthcare Leadership Academy, has been involved in the BMA for 8 years, and has dabbled in bits of media work. Esther Followwill-Johnson lives in California. She was previously a writer and actor but now dedicates most of her time to raising her children and hosting a Christian podcast "It Matters", which takes tough/controversial topics and considers what the Bible has to say about them! How can we be intentional about building and maintaining healthy Christian relationships? How can we honour God in our friendships? What does the Bible have to say to guide us through singleness and marriage? Join us as we explore this together.

10. Unity with other Christians – costly love in the face of disagreement

Most worthwhile projects that we might take on as Christian medics will involve commitment, negotiation and wisdom. Sometimes we will have profound disagreements about details or strategy with people who are ultimately seeking a similar goal to us. How should we approach these challenges? When is compromise right, and when is it wrong? What can we learn from Scripture, from church history and from contemporary theological and ethical challenges? Engaging in debate and conflict with integrity may be a loving act that helps us achieve a deeper unity than simply pretending we all agree for the sake of peace.

Alice Gerth is an anaesthetic registrar and on the board of trustees for CMF having previously chaired the junior doctors' committee. She has experience in representing minority views both in Christian and non-Christian environments and uses the written word to explore these ideas further. She believes in the importance of healthy discourse, diversity of ideas to reach a common goal and the importance of seeking to understand each other's narratives.

11. Money matters for doctors – Investing money in uncertain times

As a junior doctor, how should you think about investment? There is so much advice out there and yet most of it sounds like jargon. How does being a Christian make a difference to your priorities? This seminar aims to help you understand money, what it means, how your faith affects your decisions and whether investing is something one should do.
