Wider, Clearer, Closer

Mark Pickering sketches out our next three-year plan

t's an odd time to be planning for the future, when COVID means that organising holidays, weddings or conferences feels like pinning the tail on a moving donkey whilst blindfolded.

CMF has completed its current five-year plan, ACTIVE 2020, and along with responding to all the specific challenges of this year, we've been discerning our priorities for the coming months and years. Our next strategic plan will last for three years rather than five, due to the current uncertainties. However, we believe that God has used COVID to clarify a number of timely priorities to make us stronger and more agile to face the uncertainties of the coming years.

In October, the Board approved our draft strategic plan for 2021-2023, with three main areas of emphasis. Our core ministry activity continues, as does our overall mission of uniting and equipping Christian doctors and nurses to live and speak for Jesus. But this lays out a broad trajectory of how we want to develop CMF's ministry over these three years. What would look and feel different about CMF in three years if we succeed?

Here's a taster for you:

Going Wider, by extending our reach – CMF is the premier community of Christian healthcarers in the UK. But far too many don't know about us, or only know one aspect of what we do. We plan to extend the influence of CMF yet further, by:

- Renewing our focus on growing total membership numbers, especially amongst nurse and midwife members not because numbers are an end in themselves, but because we know there are many who are aligned with our values but are not yet part of CMF;
- Specifically emphasising poorly represented groups, such as certain ethnic groups, or geographical areas such as the Republic of Ireland;
- Developing key specialty groups and networks, encouraging members to speak into the unique issues within their own specialist communities;
- Continuing our churches engagement, helping church leaders engage with relevant CMF resources and encourage healthcarers in their own congregations to join us.

Growing Clearer, by refining our communications – Many of our members need no convincing of the vital importance of CMF's ministry. But others on the fringe need clear messages to help them grasp this. We will be working on this, along with continuing to

adapt our resources; by adjusting our ratio of print to digital resources; by refining and upgrading our website to an industry-standard platform that is more resilient and adaptable, and by investing further in our membership database, to be responsive to the ways that our members live, work and communicate.

COVID has made us adapt our conferences and meetings, from all physical to all online. Now as we look to the next phase of the pandemic, we are planning our first truly hybrid event, the Junior Doctors' Conference on 23-25 October, combining physical and online attendance as a prototype for future events. This brings new challenges but significant opportunities.

Drawing Closer, by improving our local networks – We now have 14 Catalyst Teams at varying stages of development. The next three years will be a crucial time to continue this growth, integrating key emphases such as global, prayer and pastoral care. We aim to cover the whole UK and Ireland with organic, supportive local networks of praying members that will replicate the national resources of CMF at a local level.

Underpinning these three priorities will be two foundational principles of **membership** and **engagement**.

CMF is not like a gym – it's not just about what I get out of it'; it's more like a family – we receive and give mutual support appropriate to our own circumstances. Membership fees are vital to multiplying our ministry, and we see them as missionary giving to a strategic people group. We want to be intentional about drawing people in and increasing this commitment at every level.

We also want to be giving back to our members wherever they are – as part of a local network, a training track, a specialty group, a committee or other forum; equipping them with what they need to be the hands, feet and voice of Jesus, wherever he calls them to serve.

Wider, Clearer, Closer – that's where we believe God is leading us in the coming months and years. Could you help us? Could you introduce a colleague to CMF membership? Could you get involved in a growing local network? Could you support local students or junior graduates? Is there a training track or a specialty network you could be part of? Wherever you are on your journey as a Christian doctor, nurse or midwife, there's something for you in CMF. Let's walk that journey together.

Catalyst Teams Training - online

f you could see God do one thing in your region, what would that be?' Such was the opening question to 60 nurses, midwives, allied health professionals and

medics gathered on Zoom for our first online Catalyst Teams Training on Saturday 5 September. We now have 14 Catalyst Teams across the UK. It was great to hear stories of what God has been doing in these teams, reminding us that we are called to pray and trust God to move in us first and foremost and then out to those around us.

Ros Loaker from Transform Work UK exhorted us to speak out confidently and be a blessing to our workplaces, reminding us that religious belief is a protected characteristic under the Equality Act 2010. Dr Steve Sturman shared the growing pastoral care work around the UK, and Fi McLachlan taught us about working as high-performing teams. It was great to share and pray with one another too.

We long to see Catalyst Teams embody the work of CMF locally with members fulfilling both the call God has placed on their lives using their gifts to serve him gladly – as well as fulfilling the mission of CMF where they are. This may include Pastoral Care Partners in team regions who then link up for training nationally. It might be Christian Workplace Groups who are salt and light in their organisations, who also link nationally. This locally vibrant and nationally networked pattern is what we want to extend through other roles including students, medical school links, global catalysts, small group catalysts and much more. That's the power of an envisioned and equipped network of teams across the UK.

Do be praying for our teams and that we might, by God's grace, see the UK covered by Catalyst Teams over the next three years of CMF's strategic plan. In the words of some of the delegates:

Pastoral Care & Wellbeing

Steve Sturman shares what's happening

ave you ever received a difficult complaint and wished there was somebody with whom you could



talk and pray about it? Have you faced conflict in the workplace, struggled to cope with anti-social shifts, exams and keeping your friendship network going?

Would you like to learn not only how to survive but how to thrive as a Christian in healthcare?

CMF Pastoral Care and Wellbeing (PCW) is interested in supporting Christian health professionals through precisely these sorts of situations.

Over the last nine months, there have been some important developments in PCW, accelerated by COVID-19. In early March, we established the Pastoral Care Advisory Group, with members experienced and qualified in providing spiritual support. To date, they have overseen the appointment of twelve Pastoral Care Partners(PCPs). A Wellbeing Helpline, offering support, prayer and advice has been set up and is available via wellbeing@cmf.org.uk.

We offer listening, prayer, and opportunities for reflection, as well as signposting to other sources of help. For details of local support and encouragement groups, contact your nearest Catalyst Team.

We aim to start an informal Mentoring Scheme early next year, providing an opportunity for members to 'walk with' a PCP during any phase of professional life.

We aim to have PCPs operating in every Catalyst Team across the country, where they can offer one to one and group pastoral care. The evolving Pastoral Care Team already has a vast range of experience and skills, and we will, in time, be seeking to develop specialised pastoral care in areas such as time management, medicine and the family, individual spiritual appraisal and conflict resolution.

We are seeking to enlarge the Team, and anyone interested in providing pastoral care or mentoring should get in touch with us confidentially via wellbeing@cmf.org.uk. PCPs are appointed through a simple application and screening process. As a PCP, you would receive training and development of your pastoral skills. You would be encouraged to serve locally but also to use any unique gifts or experience nationally. This may take many forms including writing, preparing media for pastoral care, facilitating special interest groups or supporting the helpline.

There is much to thank God for. Do continue to pray for the work of the Pastoral Care Team as they seek to support Christian doctors and nurses to live and speak for Jesus Christ.

Northern Ireland **Abortion Conference**

e are living in unprecedented times in Northern Ireland. That is not a reference to the Coronavirus pandemic, but to the abortion law changes which have come into force in Northern Ireland in the last few months. Despite this being a devolved issue, despite a consultation in which 79 per cent of respondents rejected any change in the legislation, despite a further consultation about details of practice under the new law, and despite a reconvened Northern Ireland Assembly voting 46-40 against the new law, it was nevertheless cunningly introduced so that, as things currently stand, it cannot be repealed. Presently in Northern Ireland, the health secretary has not commissioned abortion services in hospitals due to COVID-19. However, like other parts of the UK, medical abortion at home has become the pattern, with the only difference to England being that the first drug (misoprostol) must still be administered on registered premises.

We at CMF and LCF (Lawyers' Christian Fellowship) Northern Ireland arranged a morning conference in two parts on Zoom in September to look at the implications for us as Christian health professionals.

We looked in detail at the professional, training and legal implications of this legislation for clinicians in Northern Ireland. We also considered the roots of Christian opposition to abortion in scripture and church history, being reminded that size and functional capabilities do not determine our value as human beings made in the image of God. The whole conference was very helpful, and a reminder that we should pray as well as plan our response, because we have a good God who sees all and who loves us greatly.

Dr Mary Baines OBE, *q* Cambridge and St

care team. Her core focus was always patientcentred compassion, which enlarged to embrace family members, and she taught this approach powerfully to others by role modelling it. Her own role model was Jesus. Knowing and following him was her priority, and his love and compassion shone through her. She also had a zest for knowledge and retained this to the end of her life. She would not just want to treat a patient's symptom but would always be asking why the symptom was there, and what significance it had to that individual patient.

Her'hospice family' hugely loved Mary. These were the innumerable colleagues she has trained, guided, visited, e-mailed and prayed for all over the world. She had the ability to forge strong bonds of friendship, and these gave those working in isolated situations strength to pioneer palliative care in their settings and persevere in difficult times.

It was a gift both to her and to St Christopher's Hospice that the Lord arranged that the two weeks before her homecoming were spent in the place where she had given so much.

Dr Jany Haddad, q Damascus (born Teheran, Iran,



13 March 1954, died Aleppo, Syria, 14 August 2020). Dr Jany was a monumental figure and a leader among leaders, deeply loved by many across the world, and was very well known

by the ICMDA family and many CMF members. His achievements were breathtaking, and he will be very much missed. As the founder and president of both the Armenian Christian Medical Association (ACMA) and Living Hope for Family Ministries, he touched the lives of thousands, and he inspired many others to join him and share in the work to

which God had called him. When the Armenian earthquake struck in 1988, killing 50,000 and injuring 130,000, he felt God calling him to help this nation

and chartered two shipments of medical supplies. Out of this grew the ongoing ministry of ACMA He also founded a Baptist church in Aleppo, Syria, and this was to become a seed which led to the planting of other new Syrian churches. In 2003, during the Iraqi war, Jany began ministering among the Iraqi refugees, with medical care, food and supplies.

Through the ten years of the Syrian civil war, Jany stayed in Aleppo, operating on the wounded, caring for the sick and ministering to the broken while the bombs fell, and the bullets flew.

Jany died from complications of COVID-19 on 14 August 2020. This obituary first appeared in the blog of the International Christian Medical & Dental Association (ICMDA) on 26 August 2020.

Dr Colin R Paterson, q Oxford, 1962, died 30 March 2020. He worked as a bone physician and researcher; he courageously defended parents wrongly accused of non-accidental injury until the end of his life. He was also a strong supporter of CMF and medical missions and was involved in the organisation of many Scottish CMF conferences and local meetings.
